

Workshop on Improved Access to Green Climate Fund Designing Appropriate Project for Direct AccessEntities and Executing Entities Date: 22- 24 December 2018

Venue: CCDB Hope Foundation Ashulia, Savar, Dhaka

The Green Climate Fund (GCF) is created as a global financial mechanism of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change which aims to deliver equal amounts of funding to mitigation and adaptation. The main objective of GCF is to promote a paradigm shift to low-emission and climate-resilient development, taking into account the needs of nations that are particularly vulnerable to climate change impacts. However, to avail GCF fund and projects, potential Executing Entities (EEs) need to meet the stringent GCF fiduciary and safeguard standards and criteria of compliance along with the capacity to design comprehensive project proposal that can achieve GCF target of paradigm shift through effective implementation at local level. And there is a major concern about the capacity of potential Direct Access Entities (DAEs) particularly in terms of complying with the complicated and lengthy process of accreditation and dealing with complex formats and templates.

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) has been working in Climate Finance Governance to facilitate effective and equitable allocation of climate funds and efficient delivery of climate projects in meeting adaptation and mitigation targets. One of the major objectives of TIB's work on climate finance is to build the capacity of the stakeholders to monitor the implementation of climate change projects and to facilitate and advocate withproject implementing organizations to comply with fiduciary, administrative, environmental, social and gender issues for ensuring enhanced access to national and international climate funds. For that purpose, TIB organized a capacity-building workshop for improving access to GCF on 22th to 20th September 2018 with the participation of officials from public, private, NGOsectors, potential DAEs, potential EEs and Partners.

As demand raised from the participants of previous NIE (national implementing entities or direct access entities) workshop to organize a series of workshops to build capacity of organizations to design and develop appropriate GCF projects, this workshop will invite potential DAEs, EEs and Partners for providing them with supplementary assistance, guidelines from the successful DAEs and experts to help them developing robust and fundable project proposals. Through this capacity building initiative, participants will also have the opportunity to receive informative and critical feedback from the experts to produce concrete project proposals. Experts who have proven record can develop and formulate successful proposal to access fund from the GCF. As such, the workshop will have the following key objectives:

- Sharing the updated status of climatefunds & challenges in accessing fund from GCF;
- Providing insight about the requirements of GCF project proposal and supporting documents;
- Building capacity of EEs to develop concept notes and detailed proposals with special focus on sectoral prioritization/needs/activities to achieve paradigm shift;
- Providing expert's suggestion on the proposal to fix the conceptual and technical aspects to submit a robust project proposal to GCF;
- Creating a network among successful and potential DAEs, EEs and partners to exchange knowledge to guide in accessing GCF fund.

Participants

The participants of the workshop will be the potential and existing DAEs, EEs and Partners from Government, NGOs and CSOs. The capacity-building workshop will be conducted by theexperts from PKSF, KfW and IDCOL, thoseachieved their accreditation and were successful in developing appropriate projects from the GCF. For the invited participants, TIB will bear all the cost for the participation in the workshop including accommodation, foodand travel.
